II. Brief church history on Warrington Presbyterian Church¹

- a. Although the current Warrington Presbyterian Church was organized some 85 years later, the original Presbyterian church in Warrington dates to 1857.²

The Warrington Church near Pensacola, Florida was organized by the authority of the South Alabama Presbytery in the summer of 1857, presumably by P. J. Sparrow, H. N. Pharr, and W. A. Carter, as they were appointed to this duty the previous April. The charter members numbered fifteen, the first elder was J. E. Robinson, elected and installed. Sparrow seems to have been the only pastor they ever had. By 1860, their membership had increased to twenty. Yet Presbytery dissolved the little society October 19, 1861, after four years of life.

Rev. Patrick J. Sparrow was a self-educated man from the Carolinas, who was one of the founders and first faculty members of Davidson College, and was later President of Hampton-Sidney College of Virginia. He also was pastor of Pensacola First Presbyterian at this time.

The Civil War began April 12, 1861. On October 9th, 1861, about 1,000 Confederate Soldiers landed at Fort Pickens and unsuccessfully attempted to remove the Union forces stationed there. Minor skirmishes continued through May 1862, when Confederate withdrew from the area. Union Forces occupied the area for the remainder of the Civil War.³ It is likely that the South Alabama Presbytery disbanded the original Warrington Church, because the land upon which the original church stood was under Union control.⁴ From 1861 to 1946, Warrington was without a Presbyterian Church.

The current Warrington Presbyterian Church was organized on Friday night, September 27, 1946, at 7:30 p.m. with 115 charter members. Around 35 members were received on profession of faith that night. Three elders and three deacons were elected, ordained and installed. This church came into existence under the sponsorship of the First Presbyterian Church and the faithful labors of Rev. H. E. Iverson. The Warrington Presbyterian Church received a grant of \$5,000 from the Home Mission Emergency fund on a church home. The first meeting places were the Turner-Lee-Day School⁵ and the Navy Point Theater⁶. Mr. William Fisher, an elder of the First Presbyterian Church, donated the land on which the church is now located.

Before the formal organization meeting in early March, 1946, a "Presbyterian Advance Committee," membership comprised of session members from the McIlwain Memorial and First Presbyterian Churches, met to find a minister to organize a Presbyterian Church in the Warrington community, adjacent to the Naval Air Station. Rev. H. E. Iverson (Ned), who had just been released from the Naval Service as Chaplain, attended this meeting. Rev. Donald A. Swicord, Superintendent of Home Missions for Florida Presbytery, urged Mr. Iverson to consider this challenge. The Joint Committee extended the call and this was accepted by Rev. Iverson.

Upon arriving in Pensacola, the new minister learned that the situation had changed somewhat since his conference with the Joint Committee in that the First Presbyterian Church wished to carry on the work independent of outside help. This brought to fruition the dream of some years standing—that of giving birth to a church in Warrington. The time was now ripe.

Easter Sunday 1946 was chosen as an appropriate occasion for the founding of the new mission and the first day of its worship. Publicity was given to the event in the form of newspaper notices and handbills. With the arrival of the long anticipated day, there were in attendance for Sunday school some thirty people and approximately twice that number for morning worship. The few months following saw steady growth in the new church.

Dr. John Thomas of the First Presbyterian Church urged that the church seek a charter. At the suggestion of Dr. Thomas, Rev. C.G. Partridge was asked to help effect a called meeting of the Presbytery for the purpose of constituting a church.

The day of fulfillment arrived. Elder V. G. Philips of Tallahassee, past moderator, convened Presbytery with prayer, appointed a clerk, and asked Dr. Thomas to preside. Dr. Donald A. Swicord, Superintendent of Home Missions and returned missionary from Korea, delivered an inspiring message. The moderator stated the purpose of the meeting and Mr. Iverson replied with a statement of the readiness of the people to be formed into a church, reading as evidence, a petition signed by those who requested charter membership. To this list, Presbytery permitted six additional names to be added later, bringing the number of charter members to one hundred fifteen.

The first act of the body was to select a name. The Warrington Presbyterian Church was unanimously agreed upon. The election of church officers was the next step taken. Elders elected were Oattis H. Baker, R. D. Coble, James W. Lawson, and Hugh A. Ray. Deacons elected were John W. Burge, C. G. Davis, Alvin H. Webb, and W. E. Jones. These names were submitted by the nominating committee through the chairman, Mrs. E. C. Boos. The church unanimously called Mr. Iverson as pastor. He accepted and the charge was delivered by Rev. C. G. Partridge. Presbytery then installed Mr. Iverson as pastor.

The Warrington Presbyterian Church now stood as an independent church body, founded upon the Bible as God's Holy Word, dedicated to promulgating the Gospel, seeking to glorify the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The members continued meeting at the Turner-Lee-Day School for Sunday school and evening services with the morning service being held in the Navy Point Theater for almost a year. A Quonset Hut⁷ was purchased and erected and the pews, surplus property from the old Barrancas Chapel, were given to the Church by the Navy. On July 6, 1947, the Quonset was dedicated by Rev. John D. Thomas as a new sanctuary. On that day, the building and grounds were dedicated free of debt. The church will always be grateful to the First Presbyterian Church for the part it played in establishing the Warrington Presbyterian Church.

The first meeting of the Sunday School Class of Women of Warrington Presbyterian Church (now called the Women in the Church [WIC]) was held in the home of Mrs. C.G. Davis, 107 S. First Street, November 1946. There were nine ladies present and it was unanimously voted to have the following officers for the class:

At this first WIC meeting, the ladies decided to ask Rev. Iverson to organize a choir.

From this humble beginning the Warrington Presbyterian Church grew. Crowded conditions brought about the erection of a two-story concrete block Sunday school building located next to the Quonset hut. The church also purchased a manse at 1208 Poppy Avenue in the Lakewood subdivision.

In 1954, the Rev, John T. McCrea started the building campaign for the current sanctuary. This dream was brought to completion under Rev. Bruce Wideman. The existing sanctuary was completed and the first service held on Sunday, September 1st, 1957.

The current Fellowship Hall was completed in 1971 and sits on the location of the original Quonset hut and concrete block Sunday school building. The building was funded with a bond initiative whose underwriter went bankrupt, causing great financial distress to the church. However, God provided and the facility was paid for a few years later.

On September 9, 1973, the Warrington Presbyterian Church requested release from the jurisdiction of the Florida Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in the United States because of doctrinal differences emerging in the denomination. The request was granted on October 16, 1973. On January 6, 1974, the congregation voted to become members of the Gulf Coast Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in America. Warrington Presbyterian was received by the Gulf Coast Presbytery on February 2, 1974. This change was made in the spirit of good will towards the old denomination, yet in keeping with a desire to be faithful to the scriptures and the reformed faith.

The sixties and seventies saw the peak of membership for Warrington Presbyterian Church, with approximately 650 communicants on the church rolls. However, demographic changes and a difficult period in the mid seventies caused a reduction in membership over the next generation.

In the early nineties, the church adopted its mission, "To Know Him and to Make Him Known!" Warrington Presbyterian continues to be a small, loving and Bible-believing church to this day.

In September 2004, Hurricane Ivan caused significant damage to the facilities of Warrington Presbyterian Church. However, through God's faithfulness, resources were provided allowing for repairs and many upgrades.

IV. Vision Statement

- a. Our vision for WPC is to be a lighthouse: to shine in a dark world, to give hope through the love of Christ, to guide using the Word of God, and to illuminate our community and the lives we touch.

V. Description of Worship Services

- a. Sunday school classes begin at 9:30 a.m. each week. There are classes for everyone: nursery, children, youth, college and career, and the adult classes. Our worship service begins at 11:00 a.m. and is a blended service. Each service begins with prayer and ends

with the benediction. Three traditional hymns and two praise songs are sung; after the second hymn (children’s hymn) the young children (up to 5th grade) are dismissed for children’s church. As the sermon begins, we pray and then the Gospel is read. The sermon is preached and then the final hymn is sung. After the benediction, everyone holds hands, sings *Spirit of the Living God* and then all greet one another.

- b. The first Sunday of every month we have a prayer and praise service which begins at 6:30 p.m. We meet in the fellowship hall, circle the chairs, pray for a variety of items and interject praise music.
- c. Every Wednesday night is the Family Refresher. Dinner is served beginning at 5:15 p.m., praise music at 6:00 p.m., Bible study at 6:15 p.m. During the Bible study time, there are three separate sections: adult class, the youth and Kid Connection (children). Nursery is available.

XII. WPC Physical Resources consist of three buildings and two parking lots

- a. The **church sanctuary** is on the corner of Sunset Ave and Navy Blvd was completed in 1957 and has pew seating for about 440 people. The facility is equipped with a stage that accommodates a pulpit, choir seating, a pipe organ and piano. A sound booth and audio/visual equipment including two large projection screens were recently added. The walls, ceiling and floors are well worn and in need of repair and refurbishment.
- b. The **education building** was completed in 1971 and consists of three floors. The ground floor has a nursery, kitchen and fellowship hall that can seat up to 200 people, office spaces for the pastor, associate pastor and two secretaries. The second floor has seven main classrooms, one of which is used as the choir loft. There are ten smaller rooms some of which are used for storage. The third floor consists of two large open areas currently unused and in need of refurbishing.
- c. The **youth building** is much smaller than the other two buildings and is divided into two halves. One side is used by our youth and the other side is rented to a Korean Presbyterian church.

- d. All three structures are mortgage-free and have received new roofs, air conditioning, and heating system upgrades within the last five years.
