OVERTURE 24 from Philadelphia Metro West Presbytery (AC, CDM, MNA, MTW, RUF "Add Constitutional Precedence Statement to CC, CTS, PCAF, PCA-RBI, RH) Policy Manuals" (Revised)

[Note: An earlier version of this overture appeared online in early March. At its May 4 meeting Philadelphia Metro West Presbytery revised the first "Whereas" clause to clarify the Committees and Agencies involved. There is no other change to the original overture.]

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Whereas the Presbyterian Church in America (PCA) currently has five Permanent Committees (Administrative Committee, Committee on Discipleship Ministries, Mission to North America, Mission to the World, and Reformed University Fellowship) and five Agencies (Covenant College, Covenant Seminary, PCA Foundation, PCA Retirement & Benefits, Inc., and Ridge Haven), and may in the future have other or additional Permanent Committees and Agencies (all such current and future Permanent Committees and Agencies, collectively, the "Permanent Committees and Agencies") [BCO 14.1.12; RAO 14.1]; and

Whereas it is necessary for the Permanent Committees and Agencies to function at all times under the authority of the Constitution (as defined in *BCO* Preface III, and which includes the *Westminster Confession of Faith*, the *Larger Catechism* and *Shorter Catechism*, and the *Book of Church Order*, collectively, the "Constitution"); [*BCO* 14.1.7–8; 14.6; Article V.G of the Corporate Bylaws]; and

Whereas it is standard operating procedure for organizations to write policy manuals; and

Whereas the Permanent Committees and Agencies rightly and necessarily have at times produced their respective policy manuals; and

Whereas it is essential for every policy manual of the Permanent Committees and Agencies to remain subject to the Constitution; and

Whereas it is possible for unanticipated conflicts, potential conflicts, or ambiguities to arise between Permanent Committee and Agency policy manuals and the Constitution; and

Whereas it is a well-recognized best practice for policy manuals of organizations to explicitly state their subordination to organizational constitutional documents and by-laws;

Therefore, it is resolved that the Philadelphia Metro West Presbytery hereby overture the 47th General Assembly to add the following statement to the preface of all policy manuals of the Permanent Committees and Agencies: "At every point, this entire manual is subordinate to the entire Constitution of the Presbyterian Church in America—the *Westminster Standards* and the *Book of Church Order*. If there exists any conflict between the PCA's constitutional documents and the content and stipulations of this manual, the Constitution carries final authority."

 Further resolved, that any policy manual produced or amended by any of the Permanent Committees and Agencies shall, before becoming operational, be approved by its respective board and submitted to the General Assembly for ratification through the usual process of the reports of the Permanent Committees and Agencies.

Further resolved, that each of the Permanent Committees and Agencies report back on the implementation of these actions to their respective Committee of Commissioners at the 48th General Assembly.

Rationale:

In order to carry out their responsibilities faithfully, Permanent Committees and Agencies must be able to develop and propose policies to the General Assembly for ratification. *BCO* 14.1.7 indicates that "The Assembly's committees are to serve and not to direct any Church judicatories. They are not to establish policy, but rather execute policy established by the General Assembly." The only effective method to ensure Permanent Committee and Agency policies yield to the PCA constitution, and the only way to ensure that constitutional due process for staff of these permanent Committees and Agencies in relation to written policies, is (1) to give the PCA constitution explicitly stated priority in all policy manuals, and (2) to make policy changes according to *BCO* 14.1.7, which grants the General Assembly full visibility into proposed policies (and any wording changes to policies) in order to exercise its constitutionally-appointed powers of ratification.

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The action of the 5th General Assembly, for example, delivers a clear process in relation to the Committee on Mission to the World (CMTW). This GA action (1977, p. 72, 5–64, IV, 9) differentiated between the MTW policy manual and the MTW handbook, when it determined "the policy manual to be revised only by General Assembly procedures while changes in the handbooks (which unavoidably need continual changes to meet changing situations with regard to such things as insurance, annuity, travel, etc.) be reported annually to the MTW Committee of Commissioners (CoC) at the General Assembly for their approval." Usual process for policy changes then requires that changes/additions be submitted by CMTW to the CoC for ratification by the General Assembly, with a CMTW minute to this effect in each instance. The CoC should then include these as recommendations in their report to GA (including any minority reports).

In 2014, the 42nd General Assembly of the PCA passed Overture 6, "Child Protection in the PCA." This overture directed the Permanent Agencies and Committees "to review their policies, procedures and practices in the area of child protection, including their response to child sexual abuse disclosures, their faithfulness in reporting child sexual abuse to duly appointed proper representatives of the God-ordained civil authorities, in accordance with local laws, their care for survivors of child sexual abuse, and their future plans to help educate the PCA on child sexual abuse, and all other areas of response consistent with Scripture and the Constitution of the PCA and report to the 43rd General Assembly through the Administrative Committee, after it has referred the matter to and received a report from the Cooperative Ministries Committee." We trust that the Permanent Agencies and Committees have attended to these Overture 6 mandates, but to date no such policies or revisions to policy manuals have been reviewed by the General Assembly. A more recent example appeared in 2018, when MTW created and implemented a sexual harassment policy, which has yet to receive General Assembly ratification.
