History of Wayside Presbyterian Church (PCA)

In 1934, a simple wooden building belonging to the Free Will Baptists sat abandoned on a small lot two miles west of Chocowinity on Highway 33. Reverend W. D. McInnis, pastor from the First Presbyterian Church in Washington, NC, initiated a survey of the neighborhood and found sufficient interest for them to establish a Sunday School there. They got permission from the Baptists for the use of the building. The first record of the church was August 7, 1938. They began that afternoon with approximately one hundred attendants. In 1943, they purchased the church from the Baptists. The Albemarle Presbytery of the PCUS sent Reverend James C. Hines to lead the congregation. Under his leadership, it became Wayside Presbyterian Church on September 16, 1945, with eighteen charter members. During the 1940's and 1950's, the church grew in size and service to the area, and many new members were added to the rolls.

Since its founding, Wayside has been served by several ministers. In February 1971, Pastor Ola Forbes, Jr. began a period of service as Pulpit Supply for several years. He was installed as pastor of Wayside Presbyterian Church on October 31, 1976, and led the congregation for over 50 years with strong biblical preaching and teaching. The congregation was active in the Presbytery and supportive in the beginning of Pamlico Presbyterian Church in Oriental, NC.

On December 15, 1974, the officers of Wayside officially withdrew the congregation from the Albemarle Presbytery of the PCUS. Wayside became a member of Presbyterian Church in America (PCA) as part of the Carolina Presbytery on January 25, 1975. The church had approximately 62 active members at the time, and about 100 were attending each Sunday.

In 1976, a decision was made to build a new sanctuary and do some extensive remodeling of the old sanctuary to provide additional Sunday School rooms. The building program continued through 1978 with the new sanctuary being completed and the new pews arriving just in time for the Christmas services that year. On December 24, 1978, the first morning service was held in the new sanctuary, followed by the 9:00 pm Christmas Eve Candlelight Service. The services were beautiful indeed. Dedication services were held at Wayside Presbyterian Church (PCA), in Chocowinity, NC, on April 29,1979.

Reverend Forbes' mother played the piano for 35 years and taught her two granddaughters, Lisa and Olive, who currently continue her legacy by sharing their wonderful piano and organ talents each Sunday. Mrs. Marlene Fancher led the choir for many years. She held practice weekly and at one time there were 14 in the choir. Throughout the years, members and friends of Wayside have worshiped and enjoyed fellowship in numerous ways: Vacation Bible School, the Ingathering meal and worship every year before Thanksgiving, the Christmas program put on by the youth every year, the Christmas Eve candlelight and communion service, the church cookout in the spring, Sunday School classes for all ages, the Women in the Church meetings and fellowship, and the Men of the Church meetings and fellowship.



The past year (2021) has been a difficult one for the congregation. Reverend Forbes was diagnosed with cancer and offered to resign his position at the end of November 2021 for health reasons. Eastern Carolina Presbytery approved the dissolution of the pastoral relationship with Wayside and placed him on their rolls as honorably retired at its January 2022 meeting. He passed away February 3, 2022; his wife Gloria, who taught a Sunday School class for many years, had passed just a few weeks earlier in December 2021.

The congregation passed a resolution honoring Reverend Ola Forbes, Jr. as Pastor Emeritus on January 30, 2022. Ruling elder Ledrue Buck presented a plaque to his children Jason Forbes, Olive Waters, and Lisa Carrow at church this spring.

Our ruling elders, several retired pastors, seminary students and elders from other PCA churches have been leading worship for the past several months. The congregation held a meeting May 1, 2022, to form a pulpit search committee; they have been working since to find God's minister who will lead the congregation into the future.

Community and Area Profile

Chocowinity is located in Beaufort County, North Carolina about five miles south of Washington, North Carolina. The population of the county is estimated at about 47,000. Chocowinity was incorporated in 1959. Once known as Godley's Cross Roads, shortly before the Revolutionary War the name was changed to Chocawanateth. According to historians, the name is derived from the Tuscarora Indians who lived here several hundred years ago. Rev. N.C. Hughes, Jr. traced the name to Chocawanteth Creek, now spelled Chocowinity Creek. The meaning of



the word Chocowinity is believed to be "fish from many waters," and with Chocowinity Creek, Chocowinity Bay, and the Pamlico River, many different fish have been caught in these waters.

We are blessed with a very good educational system in the area. From preschool through college, our schools are comparable to any in the state. Beaufort County Community College offers certificates, diplomas, or an associate's degree in various curriculums.

At the Chocowinity recreation park, baseball and softball games are played, and concessions are available. Children can play on the playground, with a walking trail around the park for exercise. There are several grocery stores, a pharmacy, medical and dental facilities, and restaurants in Chocowinity.

One of eastern Carolina's best kept secrets is Cypress Landing, a development of over 600 homes with a total of 700 lots. Cypress Landing offers numerous amenities, including an 18-hole championship golf course and restaurant, a deep water marina, The Bay Club, a community center, two pools, a fitness center, tennis and pickleball courts, and several nature trails. Cypress Landing was once named one of the Top 20 Communities in the United States by New Choices magazine. Cypress Corner and other developments are rapidly growing in the area.

Twin Lakes Campground is just a short drive out of the town limits. RV campsites, cabins, or cottages are available. Twin Lakes has a game room, a pool, two lakes, a playground, and other attractions.

Washington, NC was named in 1776 for George Washington and has a rich historic district that includes the Turnage Theatre, a venue for performing arts. Other attractions include the Underground Railroad Museum, Estuarium, restaurants, fishing, boating and kayaking, and seasonal festivals along the waterfront. Goose Creek State Park is between Washington and historic Bath, the oldest town in NC. Other small towns and communities such as Aurora, Belhaven, Pantego, and Grimesland offer insight of daily life in rural eastern NC.

Greenville, NC, the Emerald City, is a gem serving as the medical, educational, cultural and economic hub of eastern NC. Twenty miles from Chocowinity, East Carolina University is one of the largest universities in the state. ECU has a world class medical school, and health care in Greenville is a model for many in the country. Greenville offers shopping, dining, and many other attractions.

Raleigh, the state capital, is two hours away and easily accessible with the excellent highway system we now enjoy. Exciting day trips can be taken to locations such as the Outer Banks, New Bern, Wilmington, Jacksonville, Morehead City, Atlantic Beach, and the town of Beaufort.


Lisa Carrow
