INTRODUCTION

The Mission Study Committee was formed following the December 2022 Session Meeting.

The Session formed this Mission Study Committee to look at the unique mission of this particular local church in this particular time and place and to envision our near future. We want to discern who God is leading us to be and where God is leading us to go.

The members of the Committee are Kristen Ali, Rich Colvin, Sharon Griffith, Tom Martinson and Kevin Olandt, Chair.

A Mission Study boils down to a church looking:

Out the window (What's our mission field?) and

In the mirror (Who are we and what gifts has God given us for this time and place?)."

Our goal is to come together as a congregation with an actionable vision for our near future - a real understanding of our place and our giftings, with real ministry priorities.

This Mission Study is intended to assist our church as we transition from the 34 year long pastorate of Rev. John S. Sheldon. This Study will serve as a resource for prospective pastors to learn about us and our vision for the near future. In addition, the process has helped us come together to remember, reflect and set goals.

We thank all the people who participated in the surveys and Gatherings. Your input has made this Study possible. Thank you to the Deacons who took care of our Luncheon arrangements, thus freeing our team to focus on the substance of our discussions.

We submit this report in anticipation of God's Future work as he leads us. May we all desire "to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God" (1 Col. 1:10b)

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1- METHODOLOGY

Our process included intentional prayer, study, fact-finding, reflection and discernment.

Team members were assigned various fact-finding tasks:

Create a Church Timeline Survey Community Leaders Gather Demographics Create Bible Studies

Five Church-wide Gatherings were held on Sunday afternoons following a light lunch:

Gatherings were announced from the Pulpit and via e-mail. Sessions included various large and small group exercises. Attendance averaged 45 people, including a number of regular attenders who are not members. Date and Topics as follows:

02/05/23 - Introduction

03/26/23 - Looking at the Past

03/12/23 - Looking at the PRESENT-Our Church and Our Denomination

04/02/23 - Looking to the FUTURE-Our Community, Our People, Our Vision

Demographics

History

- Ocean City, New Jersey was found in 1879 by four Methodist ministers as a Methodist Camp Meeting.
- 1st Pres OC was founded in 1896
- The current church building was built in 1906. Substantial additions were built in 1958 and 1972.
- Since its founding, 1st Pres OC has had 11 pastors. Pastor John Sheldon has been the Senior Pastor from 1989.
- On April 27, 2023 Session voted unanimously to request dismissal from the Presbytery for Southern New Jersey of the PCUSA denomination.
- On June 4, 2023 the Congregation approved the Dissolution of the Pastoral call with Pastor John Sheldon effective 7/31/23 due to His Desire to retire with his active duties ending June 11, 2023.

Membership

- The membership in 1995 was 318 members.
- Our current membership is 83. The population is 53% female, with 68% over 55, 99% white.
- The Total 2022 Budget for all funds was \$426,360.69. Approximately 1/3 of the giving is from non-members.
- Our average Sunday morning Worship attendance is approximately 80.
- Approximately 20 non-members regularly worship with us.

Community

- Ocean City is a resort island community at the Jersey Shore with a population of approximately 11,000. In the Summer months, the population swells to 130,000 or more.
- Ocean City does not permit the sale of alcoholic beverages. The City's slogan is "America's Greatest Family Resort"
- Over the course of a Summer, more than a million people visit Ocean City.
- The area's demographics are not expected to change in the next 5 years
- The members and attendees of 1st Pres OC come from three distinct areas- about 40% live on the island, 20% come from mainland communities of Upper Township in Cape May County, and 40% come from mainland communities of Atlantic County (Egg Harbor Twp., Linwood and Somers Point).

Congregational History

The Mission Study team created a Congregational Timeline (See Appendix A) and asked members and friends to study it and add any missing items.

In our time of reflection on the Church's past, several themes came up. Members most remembered the following Events and programs:

- VBS
- Kids programs
- Church picnic
- Choir Cantata

Significant observations:

- We have tended to have Pastors serve for long tenures.
- Many people noted that we have sent out many missionaries from our church
- Despite losing membership year after year, our budget was maintained.

Concerns brought up:

- Why did we lose the members we did and where did they go?
- We need to do a better job greeting new people and visitors.

Strengths

The members believe our strengths include a commitment to biblical preaching and teaching, strong support for Missions, a strong music program, and unity and brotherly love among the members. Other strengths include an active diaconate, expositional teaching, a commitment to Reformed theology, a requirement for membership and financial transparency.

Assets

First Pres OC has numerous assets, both spiritual and material, to help her accomplish her mission.

Among the material assets is a large building with classrooms, a Fellowship Hall that includes a full kitchen; a parking lot; a convenient location, as well as two manses.

Other assets include an up to date sound system, projections system, Sanctuary lighting, Air Conditioning, an organ, pianos, security system, phone system, bibles and hymnals.

Our Future Fund is over \$600,000.

Our Spiritual Assets include:

- The people who share their spiritual gifts including Prayer Warriors, Faith Examples, Teachers, Musicians, Givers, as wells those who share in Hospitality and Bible Knowledge.
- Our Tradition of Financial Transparency, Expositional preaching, Reformed theology, and Sound Doctrine
- Lack of Conflict
- Good Leadership
- Staff Experienced, committed Christians

Weaknesses

Many members feel that our congregation is not strong in Evangelism or Discipleship.

In recent history, the Church has had limited efforts in Evangelism; whether in outreach events or personal training. The occasional events have been attended by members and other Christians connected to the congregation, with almost no unchurched people attending.

We recognize that Discipleship and leadership development have not been pursued in an intentional way. Similarly, Examination and training of new Officers has become perfunctory.

Some members feel that transparency and communication from the leadership is lacking.

In common with many organizations, a small number of members does most of the work. We are not activating every member in ministry.

For many years our membership has declined numerically and increased in age. While this reflects community wide trends, it is not sustainable.

Financially, we have relied in recent years on large year-end gifts from two individuals. Almost 1/3rd of the giving is from non-members. For more than half of the year, our expenses exceed our income. Nevertheless, our annual budget is almost always fully funded to God's praise. Some members feel that this is not sustainable.

We note that some items were considered strengths by one group and weaknesses by another group. These include Prayer, Community Involvement, and Being Welcoming. This dichotomy highlights the different personal experiences of our people. A commitment to improving in these areas is incorporated into our Goals for the next five years (Section 4)

Our relationship with the PCUSA denomination and Presbytery for Southern New Jersey

Our 2/26/23 Gathering focused on our Mission Statement and the meaning of our commitment to be "Confessional", "Reformed", and "Presbyterian"

Through discussions, surveys and follow-up the Session determined that 97% of responding members desired to find a new denominational home. One respondent was unsure if we should leave the PCUSA. No respondents stated a desire to remain within the PCUSA.

Needs

In response to our current status and our perceived weaknesses we identify the following primary needs:

- To Provide On-going Pastoral Leadership
- To Resolve Our Request for Dismissal from the Presbytery
- An Intentional corporate and Personal Outreach to Unbelievers
- New Members, especially young families
- Current members to Commit to Staying and sharing their Gifts
- Organized Opportunities for Prayer and Discipleship

Mission Statement

When asked, most members were unaware of our Mission Statement (adopted in 2013)

However, when asked what is the purpose of our church, many of the points of our Mission Statement were included. (see Appendix **H**)

We recommend the Mission Statement be shared more widely, including with new members and leaders. In addition, the Session should regularly revisit the Statement to evaluate how we are meeting its goals and if it needs revision.

3 - WHO WE WANT TO BE

Vision Statement

Visioning work was done at two successive Congregational Gatherings and through several Mission Study Team Meetings. The group studied the purpose of Vision Statements and studied examples from corporate America and other churches.

Most Appreciated Themes: Evangelism

Feeding the Flock

Jesus is the Son of God

Our discussions showed a desire to emphasize Evangelism and Discipleship for the Future; perhaps because these are both currently perceived as weaknesses by many.

Most Appreciated Adjectives: Loving

Welcoming Faithful Believing Praying Gracious

Proposed Vision Statement:

To see our Church and our communities delighting in God, passionately following Jesus, and loving all people

We believe this statement represents a number of our aspirations

- We desire to be witnesses preaching the gospel to all our neighbors knowing that no one is beyond the reach of God's grace.
- We use the plural- "communities" recognizing that our target membership comes from a number of geographic areas within a 20 minute drive from the Campus.
- We focus on the Church first, knowing that we must continue to "preach the Gospel to ourselves" as we practice discipleship in the goal of becoming mature in Christ
- We look to our beloved Westminster Shorter Catechism first Question for a summary of our eternal purpose to "glorify God and enjoy Him forever" this is our personal desire and our desire for all unbelievers
- We desire to never lose our first love, to be always reminded of the glory of our Savior Jesus
- We desire to be continuously renewed by the transforming of our mind.
- We desire to be loving and gracious to all people regardless of race, gender, class, politics, disability, etc. in order to show forth the love of God, knowing that all people are created in God's image.

3 - WHO WE WANT TO BE

Goals for the Next 5 Years

Our Final Congregational Gathering spent time in both small groups and large group discussion setting some goals for the next five years.

Priority Goals (Next 12-24 months)

- Conclude Dismissal From Presbytery And Enter A New Denomination
- Call A New Pastor

Following are six actionable goals generated by the Congregation and adopted by the Session. We believe this goals are Specific, Actionable and Measurable:

DISCIPLESHIP:

- Start Small Group Ministry and Regular Prayer Meetings: Perhaps a monthly Small group ministry around Sunday Fellowship Lunch and Prayer
- Create a leadership development Program: Identify/seek out individuals for training

EVANGELISM

- Attract Two new families each year.
- **Plan Two Evangelism Events each Year-** Movie nights, coffee houses, Caroling in the Park, etc. These events could be in cooperation with other churches
- Develop Evangelism Ministries to unserved/at need groups: Perhaps surfers, or 11-13 year olds...
- Grow membership by 20% in 2 years thru intentional evangelism, personal invitation and Prayer: 82 members x 20% = 17 members

We present these goals knowing that others will need to establish more detailed objectives and implantation strategies.

4 - GOALS AND EXPECTATIONS FOR NEW PASTOR:

Our previous pastor served for over 34 years. Consequently, we appreciate his strengths but also recognize his weaknesses as we seek to discern what is best for us in a new Pastor.

We seek a Pastor who will share our vision for a Gospel centered revival of our church and community.

Education: Doctor or Master of Divinity from an ATS accredited seminary

Expositional Preaching:

After having two long-serving pastors who upheld the inerrancy of Scripture and practiced expositional preaching and teaching, our congregation appreciates the benefits of both. Our new Pastor must hold to biblical inerrancy and is expected to typically preach expositionally.

Reformed Theology: We strongly believe that belief precedes practice. Our new Pastor must be rooted in and conforming to Reformed Theology as expressed in the Westminster Standards.

Experience: A devoted follower of Jesus Christ. 4 to 10 years experience in Pastoral ministry is desired.

Character: A compassionate and outgoing personality with a heart for evangelism. Morally upright. Patient and humble.

Abilities: Strong expositional preaching. Able to teach biblical principles. Willing to gently correct error and sin.

Vision Casting: We look to our new Pastor to help us develop this Mission Study into tangible ministry, especially in Discipleship and Evangelism.

Collaboration: We believe the Holy Spirit has endowed our local church with every spiritual gift we need (1 Cor. 12). The Pastor should not feel responsible for running all programs. Our new Pastor should be able to delegate tasks and help identify and work with individual's gifts for the common good.

 - One product: the Nicene Creed, a brief statement of essential points.
 - Council Of Chalcedon (487 AD) defined the two natures of Christ. The representatives agreed there would be no new Creeds.
- To Confess is to openly Proclaim
- **Confessions** are declarations of the basic beliefs of a Denomination
 - These serve to unite the believers in faith and practice
 - They serve as guiderails to limit private interpretations of Scripture
- 1567- Church of Scotland adopts the **Scots Confession** as its sole doctrinal standard
- 1647- Church of Scotland adopts the Westminster Confession of Faith as its sole doctrinal standard along with a Larger and Shorter Catechism
 - 1788- Presbyterian Church in the United States modifies the Westminster Confession primarily to remove royal authority
 - 1903- Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A adds two chapters to woo Arminians:
 - Ch. 34 Of the Holy Spirit
 - Ch. 35 Of the Gospel of the Love of God and Missions
 - 1967 Merger of two Northern Presbyterian Churches creates a new Confession of 1967
 - 1983 Merger creates a Book of Confessions, abandoning the Westminster Confessions as its sole doctrinal standard

Abortion

HSB-11 affirms that women and pregnant people are full moral agents, ... and it supports their moral capacity to decide whether to continue or end any given pregnancy. Denounces attempts to prevent people from receiving abortion care. (Approved 348-38)

Book of Confessions: The Church will form a committee to write a new PC(USA) confession.

LGBTQIA+ Equity. The assembly created a **new LGBTQIA+ Equity Advocacy Committee** as a permanent committee of the General Assembly

Israel/Palestine

INT-02 "recognizes that the laws, policies, and practices of the government of Israel regarding the Palestinian people fulfill the international legal definition of apartheid." (Approved 266-116)

Fossil Fuel Divestment

ENV-10 calls for divestment from five oil and gas companies. The assembly said the companies were not doing enough to slow global warming. (340-41)

Immigration

IMM-06, allows the church to declare itself a "Sanctuary and Accompaniment Church." that supports and encourages its congregations, mid councils, and members to support immigrants, refugees, asylum seekers, and their children, and to resist efforts by the government to separate families. (Approved 340-25)

Gun Violence

General Assembly approved a motion that the church renew its commitment to end gun violence by developing a 10-year campaign, the Decade to End Gun Violence (2022 – 2032).

Racial Justice: RGJ-08: "On Offering an Apology to African Americans for the Sin of Slavery and Its Legacy." White Presbyterians read aloud "A Litany of Repentance" found in RGJ-08, which begins with the words: "As white Christians we repent of our complicity in the belief in white supremacy."

1. Gracious Dismissal from PCUSA

- Presbytery is Gracious. Process is smooth and takes 6 to 12 months. Property is Maintained.
- New Denomination helps us Find a New Pastor. Slowly rebuild membership and Improve Outreach to the Lost

- Presbytery is Adversarial. Two Year or Longer Process. Property is Lost.
