Redeemer Presbyterian Church is a healthy and established worshiping community in Central Texas that celebrates the gospel together, throws great parties and feasts together, and welcomes others in to encounter Jesus and his grace. We are looking for a new pastor because God has called our first pastor, David Rapp, and his family to establish a new church in the Denver area. We need someone who is able to communicate our beliefs and practices intelligibly to all kinds of people and to lead the church in welcoming people from various spiritual and cultural backgrounds, including those who are not yet Christians.

Redeemer has always been actively involved in church planting. God is growing us into an anchor church to continue as a sending church which supports church planting, RUF campus ministries, and other missions. We are also a sending church in that medical residents and army personnel often join our community for a period of time and then go out to live all over the world.

Our church has been in a numerical growth phase for several years now, and we expect it to continue to flourish. As we have grown, we have moved into a medium church size category and culture. We need a pastor eager to meet the challenges that must be negotiated as our staff and organizational complexity grow. We look forward to identifying and working with a pastor who resonates with our vision and is eager to lead the church as we grow into a multi-staff church with lots of volunteers and expand to two worship services. This packet is an invitation for you to explore our church community and get to know us.

Mission

That is what is taking place in heaven right now and it is what the Church will do for all of eternity. For this reason, worship is at the center of all that we do. It is what everything else in the life of the church revolves around. Worship gives us a place to express the whole range of human emotions, but it is also primarily a formative experience where God actually shapes our hearts and desires to conform us into the image of his Son. Worship is where God gives us what we need most... himself. Worship pumps the gospel through the church body week after week, so that we are empowered to love and serve our neighbors and our city.

GOSPEL-DRIVEN MISSION | A PLACE TO BELONG BEFORE YOU BELIEVE

We do not exist only for ourselves, but for those whom God has called us to love and serve and to tell about the wondrous grace of God. We exist to be a blessing to our neighbors, the City of Temple, and the world. We aim to be a missional church, warmly extending our welcome to seekers, skeptics, those who have been burned out by the church and the world, those who are bored, and the spiritually hungry. Our Story

A NEW COMMUNITY | 2008-2011

God was at work in the Temple/Belton area long before this church existed. In 2008, David and Jennifer Rapp moved to Temple with their three children to work in conjunction with Redeemer Presbyterian Church in Waco and the Southwest Church Planting Network of the PCA to help establish a new church. A weekly Bible study with four families grew into a larger group who gathered in the Rapps' living room to dream and pray and embrace a vision for a new church. Out of this group came a core group and a launch team which worked to prepare for holding worship services. After a series of public vision meetings held at the Railroad Heritage Museum, and five preview worship services at the Cultural Activities Center (CAC), Redeemer's first public worship service took place on September 19, 2010 in Wendland Hall at the CAC. In March 2011, Redeemer received its first members and began worshiping in the auditorium of the CAC.

A GROWING COMMUNITY | 2011-2020

God continued to gather a welcoming community of people who worshiped together, threw great parties and feasted together, and invited others into their lives. On September 20, 2015, Redeemer was organized as a particular congregation of the PCA with its own government by elders serving on the Session.

In 2018, Redeemer purchased the historic First Presbyterian Church building in downtown Temple. After extensive renovation construction in 2019, Redeemer was ready to move into its own building and welcome the community to join us for Easter 2020. Our attendance at the CAC had reached 190, and we expected we would need to move to two worship services in the new building almost immediately. Then the COVID-19 pandemic hit. Redeemer's last worship service at the


CAC had five people present to conduct our first livestream worship service before the CAC officially closed the next day. Providentially, we were able to move into the new building the next week and conduct livestream worship services for a few months before continuing with a very gradual return to normal in-person worship.

AN ESTABLISHED COMMUNITY | 2020-present In May 2021, Redeemer added more elders and our first deacons, eventually establishing a deacon team to be comprised of deacons, as well as men and women deacon assistants who are appointed by the Session to assist the deacons in caring for those who are in distress or need. In May 2021 we also celebrated a delayed but incredibly joyful building dedication service. In addition to officers, God has given Redeemer a wonderful and growing staff team who serve the church and lead us in mission.

With people coming for medical training and others serving in the military, over the years Redeemer has loved and been served by so many people who have been a part of our community and story and have been sent out to serve Christ in other churches around the country and the world.

Through all of the joys and the challenges, God has continued to grow Redeemer, gathering people from various backgrounds and all ages to be a part of a gospel-centered community that does not exist only for itself, but for those who do not yet know Jesus.

Our Church Life

Our congregation is primarily made up of families and married couples of all ages and backgrounds (90% of adults are married). We live in an area with a large turnover rate due to the medical and military communities, and the rhythm of life in our church reflects this. Each year, we expect to say goodbye to dear friends and also welcome many new families and individuals.

More than half our congregants do not have a Presbyterian heritage. Many of us were drawn to Redeemer because of the genuine community here. Our church family truly desires to be a welcoming people that understand our need for God and one another and lives that out by confessing sins to one another, bearing one another's burdens, and celebrating God's work in each other's lives.

Besides Sunday morning worship, the main way we encourage participation in the life of the church is in Community Groups. Community Groups meet 10-12 times per semester at homes around the area to share a meal, discuss Scripture, and pray together. Groups start fresh each semester to give everyone the opportunity to join in or switch groups and make new friends.

When it comes to other ministries, we are concerned with intentionality over plurality. We want to be respectful of our congregants' time and energy and invest in a few programs that will connect the people of Redeemer to Christ and to each other without overloading them with more "things" to fill their calendars.

Our men's ministry hosts a monthly Pub Night at various local venues as well as a highly-anticipated annual retreat. Our 2022 retreat was attended by 39 men, ranging in age from 18-70, who gathered at a Texas ranch for a weekend of delicious food, treasured worship and study, and other activities including shooting, paintball, fishing, and many outdoor and indoor games. Our men strongly value opportunities to fellowship and share strengths and weaknesses, bearing each other's burdens in community.


Our women's ministry has a regularly scheduled Fall and Spring Bible Study. We regularly have a women's study that meets Friday mornings and offers childcare. We usually have a few small groups of women. Women have made connections, deepened relationships and studied God's word together on a regular basis for several years and has become an anticipated event within our church. This summer we have offered a monthly book club for women to participate in. We have offered retreat days as of recently and hope to attend a retreat soon to help refresh, encourage and deepen our relationship among women and most importantly with Jesus.

Our youth ministry, Redeemer Student Ministry (RSM), serves students in grades 6-12 and meets during the Sunday school hour and on Wednesday evenings. Gatherings include time for building friendships and for studying the Bible together as we seek to disciple students to love and obey God as well as love and serve others. We also participate in summer camps through Reformed Youth Ministries (RYM) and had 32 middle and high school students attend RYM camps in 2022.

We also have a thriving Children's Ministry that includes a nursery for infants and toddlers, Sunday School classes, and a children's worship program during the sermon for 4- and 5-year-olds called "Training in the Pews". The overarching goal of these programs is to saturate our children's hearts and minds with God's Word so that they see and adore Jesus as the hero of the Bible and trust in him as their Savior.





LOCAL

YOUNG LIFE | Young Life is active in various high schools in our area and is making a difference in the lives of students by pursuing them with quality friendship to point them to Christ.

FAMILY PROMISE | Family Promise of East Bell County aims to help families experiencing homelessness to achieve sustainable independence through a community-based response.

CHURCHES TOUCHING LIVES FOR CHRIST | CTLC is an evangelical cooperative ministry of churches, individuals, businesses, and organizations working together to meet the food and clothing needs of individuals in order to introduce them to Christ. CTLC is currently supported by over 30 area churches and serves all rural areas within east Bell County.

BRIDGE EAST TEMPLE | Founded by Redeemer members, Bridge East Temple (The 411 House) is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to create a space of belonging that champions young leaders in East Temple and invites them to dream, discover, and change the world for the glory of God.

HOPE PREGNANCY CENTER | Hope Pregnancy Center Temple was established by local leaders in 1980 to meet the emotional, spiritual and practical needs of women experiencing unplanned pregnancies.

REGIONAL

NORTH TEXAS PRESBYTERY | Redeemer is part of the North Texas Presbytery, a regional portion of the Presbyterian Church in America (PCA) that was formed in 1973 to be a denomination that is "Faithful to the Scriptures, True to the Reformed Faith, and Obedient to the Great Commission."

SOUTHWEST CHURCH PLANTING NETWORK | The Southwest Church Planting Network is a cooperative work of 75 churches in Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, with the aim of planting more PCA churches and starting RUF programs in our region.

REFORMED UNIVERSITY FELLOWSHIP (RUF): BAYLOR & UT TYLER | The college ministry of the PCA, RUF reaches students for Christ and equips them to serve. Redeemer financially supports RUF at two of our regional universities, Baylor University and the University of Texas at Tyler.

RUF INTERNATIONAL AT UT DALLAS | RUFI aims to reach international students on college campuses for Christ. Redeemer financially supports RUFI at the University of Texas at Dallas.

BENT TREE | Bent Tree exists to remind pastors of their callings as followers of Jesus, pastors, husbands, fathers, brothers, children, and friends. The ministry provides rest, wisdom and fellowship through online communities, national gatherings and training events, pastoral coaching relationships, and counseling.

GLOBAL

JOHN AND KATHY CLOW | Also members of Redeemer, the Clows serve with MTW (Mission to the World) in Honduras, where John is the team leader in La Ceiba and country coordinator.

PASTORS DISCIPLESHIP NETWORK - UGANDA | PDN was established in 2008 to train and equip pastors and their wives with critical ministry and life skills to help them lead and teach their congregations while fostering personal development in order to deepen the church and to advance the Gospel of Jesus Christ through healthy churches.

Where We Live

Located alongside I-35 an hour north of Austin and 2 hours south of Dallas, Temple is in the heart of Texas. There has been growth of over 40% in the past two decades, although Temple maintains its small-town feel.

Temple, originally a railroad town, now has a very diverse economy with a strong emphasis on health care and education. More than a guarter of the jobs in Temple are provided by either Baylor Scott & White Health (BSWH) or the Central Texas Veterans Health Care System (CTVHCS). Both systems support robust postgraduate medical education, such that there are over 500 residents and fellows in various medical specialties being trained at any one time in Temple. US News and World Reports recently rated satisfaction of the residents in the residency training programs at BSWH in Temple second among all residency training systems in the U.S. BSWH/Scott & White Clinic has been the primary clinical teaching venue for the Texas A&M College of Medicine since its inaugural class in 1977. BSWH will become the second Baylor College of Medicine clinical campus beginning in the summer of 2023, ensuring and strengthening the commitment to medical education in this community. CTVHCS serves over 100,000 Veterans in the Central Texas region, including the largest number of Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iragi Freedom Veterans anywhere.


In addition to medical education, Temple is the site for Temple College, a community college serving 5000 students with a very diverse educational portfolio. In nearby Belton, the University of Mary Hardin Baylor (UMHB) is a private Christian university with approximately 3500 students annually. In addition to the many strong liberal arts academic programs at UMHB, UMHB is perennially nationally competitive in Division III football and is

the reigning national champion. Both Temple College and UMHB have nursing programs in affiliation with BSWH, and UMHB also trains physician assistants, social workers, marriage and family counselors, and doctoral physical therapy students. UMHB is considered #21 in the U.S. for educational value by U.S. News and World Report.

30 miles to the west of Temple sits Fort Hood, one of the largest US military installations in the world at 214,968 acres. Fort Hood is the only post in the United States capable of stationing and training two armored divisions and has a populations of 53,416 soldiers and civilian staff.

Temple and Belton are home to two sizeable lakes and many city parks – providing plenty of opportunities to get out and enjoy the more pleasant fall and spring months. Summers are hot, with average temperature highs in the 90s, and often in triple digits. Winters are generally mild, with only occasional freezing temperatures.

Temple and nearby Belton have a combined population approximating 110,000, but within a 35mile radius there are over 450, 000. In Temple, the population is mostly White (52%), Hispanic (29%), or Black (15%). In 2020, the median household income of Temple households was \$53,723. However, 13% of Temple families live in poverty. The cost of living in Temple is 13% lower than the national average. The median home price is now \$154,400, with a median rental cost of \$1023/ month. About half of the people in Temple consider themselves as religious, with 18% being Baptist, 9% Catholic, 5% Methodist, <1% Presbyterian, 15% other Christian, and 3% other non-Christian. The only PCA churches in the immediate area are Redeemer (Temple) and Hill Country Church (Killeen).
